> The newest venue comes with superstar pedigree. Madame ZuZu's Tea **House** (582

Roger Williams Avenue), the passion project for Smashing Pumpkins' frontman and Highland Park resident Billy Corgan, opened

in September. On opening night, Corgan enthralled a standing room only crowd with an acoustic set of Smashing Pumpkin favorites and the odd Hank Williams classic.

But don't expect Corgan to be the house musician. As this issue went to press, a performance night policy was a work in progress. Corgan, however, has said in interviews that he envisioned the tea house as a haven for performing arts, including live music and poetry readings.

Teen Talent

In downtown Highland Park, the teen club NOVA-HP (1770 First Street) offers teens a venue to hear concerts performed by bands comprised of their peers. "We try to match up bands from different high schools so kids from around the area who otherwise wouldn't get to know each other have the chance to meet," said co-executive director Andrew Holzman.

The bands practice at NOVA-HP and then play on weekends. The concerts, held once or twice a month, are part of the not-forprofit facility's mission to empower local youth, Holzman said. "We bring in high school bands to show kids that given the opportunity, they can make something on their own."

One of those bands is October Road. featuring guitarist Ryan Slack, 15, a Deerfield High School student. "It's great to have a place like this to play in front of people," he said. "It's well organized, and they have a great sound system."

Join the Club

If instead of watching live music, you'd like to play it, join the club - **The Shed** (1480 Old Deerfield Road), that is. The Shed is akin to a country club or health club, except

its members are "people with a love of music," among them professionals who put aside their rock star dreams to pursue a career, but now want to play music again.

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MUSIC SCENE

The facility offers members the chance to practice, record, network, or just hang out in a "high-end facility," said general manager Lauren Blumenthal.

Membership has its privileges, but there is also a pay-as-you-go option for local bands that want to practice and record. The public is invited to attend jam sessions held every other Friday from 8 p.m.-11 p.m. The cost is \$15.

The Shed is also available for private events, such as holiday parties.

Plugged/Unplugged

In neighboring Highwood, live music is literally right down its "Alley." Steve Goldstein bought the **The Alley** (210 Green Bay Road) five years ago, fixed it up, and installed a state-of-the-art sound system. Offering live music on weekends, he said, adds a unique aspect to the neighborhood fixture.

Highwood also has restaurants that feature solo acoustic players, duos, or small trios. **Cellar Gate Winemarket** (524 Sheridan Road), for example, serves up light rock, as well as unique wines and small plates on the weekends. But, Goldstein said, "There needs to be a place where people can see rockin' bands."

The Alley surely fits that bill, as does Highwood's **Bridie McKenna's Irish Pub** (254 Green Bay Road) and Highland Park's **Vibe at 1935** (1935 Sheridan Road). McKenna's features Irish music and dance on the first Tuesday of each month, karaoke on Friday, and live music on Saturday. Vibe offers a Tuesday blues jam as well as live music on weekends that's loud

spring evenings with a string of BGH \$10 Classics concerts. The series runs through April in the 450-seat Bennett Gordon Hall in the John D. Harza building on the park grounds (201 St. Johns Avenue).

The Empire Brass ensemble, in its first Ravinia concert in 20 years, will perform a Christmas concert on Dec. 6 at 8 p.m. The program will feature vocals by Elisabeth von Trapp, the granddaughter of Maria and Baron von Trapp, whose life story was immortalized in "The Sound of Music."

Lend a Hand

"Highland Park is a giving community," notes Aimee Krupp, owner of Principessa Children's Boutique in Ravinia. "I'm part of the community, so I try to give back."

Principessa (453 Roger Williams Avenue, 847-926-0500, www. principessaboutique. com) is one of the city's upscale resale shops that have made charitable donations an integral part of its

business plan. Clients who offer items for consignment are asked to sign an agreement specifying that anything not sold within a specific period of time will be donated to a charity or charitable cause.

Principessa specializes in boutique labels (no "big box" labels, and nothing over two years old) for girls and boys ages newborn to tweens. Krupp has nurtured a loyal following that stretches from our community

to as far west as Los Angeles and as far east as Boston. "They know I can sell (their clothes) for them," she said. Another draw

to the store is a selection of new gift items, ideal for children's birthday parties.

Principessa's consignment period is generally 90 days. Recently, Krupp said, of 5,000 items that had come in, she was left with perhaps two or three racks of unsold clothes. These were donated to charity. "We also donate items people drop off that I can't use."

Krupp said, "You have to trust us that we're going to try and sell for you, but I always say that if your clothes mean that much to you, don't consign them," as unsold items are donated to worthwhile causes. These include ORT in Highland Park; the National Council of Jewish Women in Wilmette; and the LYDIA Home Association in Chicago, which as part of its mission, offers a home for abused children. Customers often will suggest the charities to which they want their unsold clothes donated. "My customers feel good that their clothes are going somewhere" that they are needed, Krupp said.

Loree Wasserman, owner of **Loree's Closet** (1500 Old Deerfield Road, Units 19 and 20, 847-748-8451, loreescloset.com), a full-service eBay luxury consignment business, also emphasizes the importance

of charitable giving. One of the options Wasserman offers her clients is to donate a portion of their proceeds to any of the thousands of charities represented on the online bidding site. Many clients, she said, want "some or all of the money received (from the sale of an item) to go to a charity that is dear to their heart."

Inspired by her clients' generosity, Wasserman makes a year-end donation to all the charities her clients have chosen in Loree's Closet's name. "We like to support the charities that are important to them," she said.

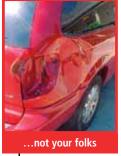
In its service to clients, Wasserman's company performs all the necessary research, pricing, form submission, and professional photography for eBay-listed items. Loree's Closet also offers pick-up as well as in-home consultation on whether an item is a buried treasure (one recent client, for example, received a \$350 bid for a "Clue" game board she found in the attic and initially planned to discard).

Co-owners Susan Gerber and Gilat Zamost of **My Best Friend's Closet** (1780 Green Bay Road, 847-681-0002, mybestfriendsclosethp.com) also promote charitable donations. The upscale consignment shop supports Chicago-based not-for-profit Bridge to Success, which helps women in need dress to re-enter the workforce. "Everything we sell is two years old or less, however sometimes we get older business suits that we can't use" in the store but that work extremely well for a donation, Zamost said.

In addition, donating to Bridge to Success, My Best Friend's Closet also has made clothing donations to Chicago city charter schools, and the shop has donated prom and bar mitzvah-ready formalwear to students in need at Highland Park High School and Elm Place Middle School, respectively.

My Best Friend's Closet offers consigners a 60-40 split on proceeds. If an item doesn't sell in the store or at the Chamber of

Sharon Nudell, owner of **Sharin' Unlimited** (1510 Old Deerfield Road, 847-579-1500), is similarly civic minded, donating to several charities and personal causes, including The

Lake County Haven, which serves homeless women and children, and the Chicago Lighthouse, which assists people who are blind or visually impaired.

In its nondescript warehouse location,
Sharin' Unlimited, (open only Fridays and
Saturdays), sells designer resale and deeply
discounted new clothing, plus shoes and
accessories. To those in the know (Nudell
shuns advertising, but loyal customer word
of mouth keeps the store "crazy busy"),
the store has the friendly, welcoming vibe
of "Cheers," the fictional TV series bar
where everybody knows your name. "Eighty
percent know each other," she said. "You
walk in the door, and you feel accepted."

Nudell encourages networking among her customers. "Whether you're looking for a doctor or a hairdresser, someone here probably will have a recommendation for you." In addition, she said, "We have found people jobs."

Nudell considers this too as her way of lending a hand to others. "I've had a lot of trouble in my life, but I also feel very blessed," she said, "so I give back to the community because it has supported me. It's an important part of who I am."



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The Post Office STAMPS OUT LONG



Instead of delivering via sleigh, Santa might want to consider using the U.S.

Post Office in Highland Park this season, as mailing packages and letters has gotten quite a bit easier. For example, just like supermarkets that open a new register when checkout lines get long, Postmaster Vickie Henderson

and her veteran staff now open another counter if there are more than three people in line. Of course, if a customer wants to avoid a line altogether, he or she can head to the Automated Postal Center (APC) that's located in the lobby of the Post Office building (833 Central Avenue).

The APC offers a self-service approach to weighing, calculating, and applying exact postage for mailing Priority Mail® items, packages, first-class letters, and Express Mail®. (Note that Express Mail overnight packages are automatically insured to \$100). And there's no need to rush to get a package to the Post Office by closing time, because the APC is available for use at any hour of the day or night.

If you want more convenience than even the APC offers, the Post Office gives you additional options. For about the last

10 years, one of the Post Office's partners, the website "stamps. com" has allowed people to pay for and then print stamps on a home printer. And now by accessing usps.com, people at home can use the Post Office's Click-N-Ship® option to print postage labels for packages and then schedule a carrier

pickup. The mail carrier who picks



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up a package will scan the bar code on the label.

You can email Postmaster Henderson at VictoriaHenderson@usps.com, with questions about all Post Office offerings. Or stop in and see her in person to learn about the Automatic Postal Center, or to pick up some new holiday stamps. This year's lineup features a Forever Stamp of the Holy Family and a four-stamp "Santa and Sleigh" series. Also offered this season are

the traditional Eid, Hanukkah, Madonna of the

Candelabra, and Kwanzaa stamps.

You can also email Henderson or ask her in person about how the Highland Park Post Office works closely with Santa Claus to answer letters addressed to him. Henderson said that for the third consecutive year, the local post office will participate in the U.S. Post Office's "Letters to Santa" annual letter-writing program, a campaign that helps fulfill the holiday wishes of children and their families. Henderson explained that "through the Letters to Santa program, members of the public

and charitable organizations respond to letters addressed to Santa Claus, the North Pole, Operation Santa, and other seasonal characters."

The Postal Service expects to deliver more than 17.9 billion cards, letters and packages between Thanksgiving and New Year's Eve during this holiday season.

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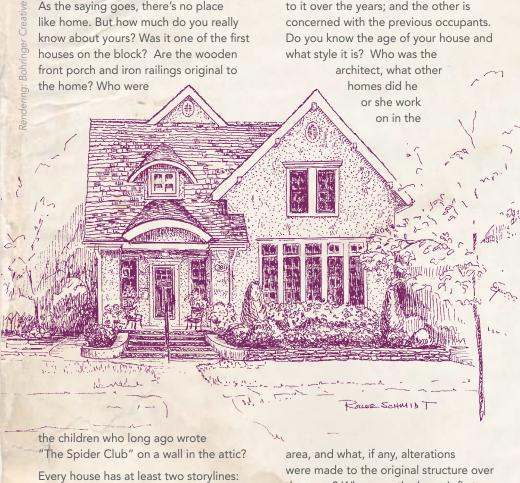
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Your House's History

These are captivating questions for amateur house detectives. To seek out clues to your home's history, you can visit the Highland Park Historical Society, the Highland Park Public Library, and the Highland Park Building Department, all of which offer various resources to help solve mysteries about your house's past.

The Historical Society, for example, holds real estate records that include information on an individual home's buyers and sellers, as well as the realty companies that were used. The Society also has historical photographs of many houses throughout the area, as well as information on house number and street changes that took place in Highland Park between 1950 and 1952.

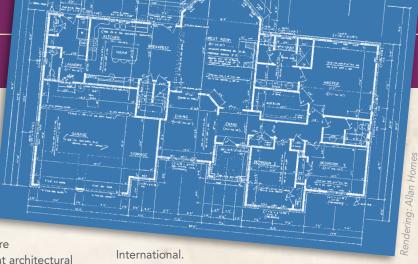
The Society's Archives and Research Center is where you'll find a collection of blueprints and abstracts of title for different properties. An abstract of title, which lists previous owners of the property from the original owner onward, is useful for those who want to learn about the ownership history of a specific lot of land over time. You are welcome to search the Society's collections at www.highlandparkhistory.org.

One of the most distinctive things about Highland Park is its rich collection of beautiful homes, many of which were designed in signature styles by well-

known architects. If you are interested in learning what architectural style your house is, the Society can help explain the most common styles used in the area. Historic revival styles from the 1920s through the 1940s found in Highland Park include Colonial, Dutch Colonial, Spanish, Cape Cod, Tudor, French Eclectic, and Italian Renaissance. Local homes in styles not based on historic precedent include Craftsman, Prairie, and



Other popular 20th Century house types in our community include Bungalow, Ranch, and Split Level.

Architectural Resources in Highland Park, Illinois, a publication created for the City of Highland Park, offers information and photos of these various styles. This publication, available online at www.cityhpil.com/documents/21/historic_green_bay_corridor_survey.PDF,

highlights the work of many well-known architects who worked locally. These architects include Ivan Robert Peterson, whose mid-century design styles ranged from historic revivals to contemporary Ranches; pioneers of the modern period Henry Dubin and Philip Anthony Faro; and post-WWII architect Greta Lederer, described

in a June 6, 1957, Chicago Daily Tribune article as a "serene looking woman who's far from serene, a demon for work, and a mass of contradictions."

Some of the more famous designers who worked locally include David Adler, John S. Van Bergen, Frank Lloyd Wright, Howard Van Doren Shaw, and Robert E.

Seyfarth. If such a prominent architect designed your house, consider consulting the Art Institute of Chicago's online catalog, www.ryerson.artic.edu/.

The numerous resources offered to house history-detectives by the Highland Park Public Library include Your Highland Park Home: A Research Guide. This guide, offered on the Library's website (www.highlandpark.org/homeresearch.html), gives information on title research, assessment rolls, and other aspects of individual house research. The Library also has city directories, biographical indices, historical newspapers, and a local obituary index (www.highlandpark.org/obits/index.html) that can be helpful in researching homes and their past owners. In addition to the resources and staffs at the Historical Society and the Library, you can get help in your house sleuthing from local realtors and the Highland Park Building Department. Highland Park architectural surveys, which cover different areas of the community, are available online at www.cityhpil.com.

The Highland Park Historical Society has two upcoming events that are relevant to people interested in the history of houses. "What Style is it? Residential Architecture of Highland Park" will be the focus of a winter workshop, and in the spring, the Society will offer a program on Historypin, an interactive online site that allows users to share historic content by posting images, stories, and oral histories. For more information, call the Society at 847-432-7090.

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Luxury eBay Consignment By Loree's Closet

If you work in a construction related trade, one statistic that is closely watched is the number of new home starts. Fortunately, residential new construction has been up a bit for the first time in years, which got me thinking that readers might want some tips on how to choose a homebuilder. Many of these same ideas hold true of selecting a home remodeler.



1. Know What You Want

You need to have a clear understanding of what you would like the final project to look like, and how much involvement you want to have along the way.

Assess your needs by asking yourself these auestions:

- How much time do I have to invest in the building process?
- How much research am I able to do on the products, appliances, and finishes?
- How much guidance am I prepared to offer during the construction process?
- Do I want to bother with addressing fine details, or will I let the builder handle them?

2. Get a List of **Builders**

- Visit the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce website at: www.chamberhp.com for names of area builders.
- Check out the National Association of Home Builders (NAHB) website at www.nahb.org or the Home Builders Association of Illinois site at: www.hbai.org.
- Look in the real estate section of the local newspaper for builders and projects. Review the ads to see which builders are constructing the type of home you are looking for and to gauge the prices you can expect to pay.

Ask friends. relatives, and local real estate agents for recommendations.

3. Proper Research and **Investigation**

Check the Better Business Bureau's website to make sure your contracting firm doesn't have an excessive amount of complaints. If the firm checks out, the next step is get a list of references and ask the following questions:

- Did the builder stay on budget?
- Did the builder complete the project on time?
- Was the builder helpful with recommending construction materials and finishes?
- Did the builder return calls quickly?
- When problems arose, did the builder

respond in a timely manner and resolve problems satisfactorily?

What did the builder do well? What could have been done better?

Additional questions to ask the prospective contracting firm:

- Have they won any awards?
- Do they have a portfolio of residences like the one you want to build?
- Are they members of any professional trade associations?
- How long have they been in business? You want someone who has been around for more than five years.
- Does the firm have a permanent business address?
- Ask your builder for a certificate of insurance that lists you as an additional insured, is up to date, and has the coverage for auto, workman's compensation, and liability. The liability amount must cover the cost of your new home.

4. Choose a Builder You Like

Signing a contract to build or remodel a home is a big commitment. If you want to be heavily involved in your project, make sure you and your builder will get along on a business level, because you will be spending a lot of time together. If the relationship does not feel right, move on until you find the right match.

5. Understand the Warranty

Ask your building firm what their warranty covers, for how long, and by whom. The relationship with your builder will last for a while after the construction is complete. Contact the NAHB to find out what the local industry standard is for a home warranty. If your builder does not offer at least the average warranty, find a different contractor.

6. Get It in Writing

Have the builder specify what is included in the price. Ask the builder for the allowance amounts for things like lighting fixtures, flooring, and cabinetry, and then visit local suppliers of such items to see if those allowances are realistic. Some builders will use smaller allowances to make their bid more attractive and then charge for upgrades later.

Read and understand the written contract. Better yet, have it also reviewed by a lawyer. You don't want to be stuck in a one-sided contract. You might consider including such performance goals as job completion dates or guarantees on estimates. Also consider a back-up plan should something happen to the builder personally (this is referred to as a performance bond).

7. Ask for Help

I have been in the construction industry for years, and I don't know it all. Don't think that you have to be the expert on everything. There are hundreds of choices associated with building materials, finishes, and designs. Ask for help from experienced sources.

CITY MANAGER DAVID KNAPP

In May, Highland Park welcomed David Knapp as its new City Manager.

Knapp came to Highland Park with 42 years of city management experience spent in such communities as San Diego, Cupertino, Boulder, and Los Gatos. Knapp is also a husband, father, grandfather, and, as was revealed in our conversation, a man with an interesting life story.

A city manager's job is unique. Did you wake up one day and say, "Gee I think I'll be a city manager?" Seriously, what was your path to this job?

My dad, an Episcopal priest, died when I was 11 years old and my mom was headmistress at a private nursery school. I went to Texas Military Institute starting in eighth grade, and when it came time to choose a college, I selected Sewanee, the University of the South. At Sewanee (then an all mens' college founded in 1858 by Episcopal bishops), I studied philosophy, and I waited to see if the call (to the priesthood) came. Well if it came, it was so faint, I never heard it. In '62-63, I headed to graduate school at the University of Texas because that was where Kay was (Kay would later become his wife; they have been married 49 years).

I received a Ford Foundation grant to study Learning Theory and Psychology. At the end of my first year, I was drafted, and not looking good in green, I volunteered for the Air Force. The Air Force sent me to a school for electrical engineers who were developing electronic countercounter measures to unscramble jamming (interference with communications and Radar). Finishing my tour with the Air Force in Europe, North Africa, and the Middle East, I went to the personnel

office, wondering what career field I should pursue. Their assessments indicated that I was best suited to go into public administration. "What's that?" I asked. It was, of course, working for cities.

How did you come to move from California to Highland Park? Was it the glamour or the phenomenal weather?

(laughs) It was to be closer to my grandsons, while continuing the work I love in an outstanding community. It was clearly a good match in that the City Council was seeking an organizational culture change which was compatible with my view of how things should work. Plus, I get to add a dimension to my grandsons' lives.

Highland Park is a spectacular place to live, as it offers all the charm of small town living with the added benefit of being so close to the big city of Chicago. What can be done synergistically to help our community thrive?

The primary purpose of government is to build community. It's about creating opportunities for community interaction and activity, as well as promoting a good school system, a vibrant Chamber of Commerce, a renowned hospital, the Ravinia Festival, and various local organizations and events. Many community interactions take place at the block level. The quality of life depends on having good relationships. I'd like to encourage block parties and make it easier for neighbors to hold them. Neighbors should get to know each other and develop a list of everyone's name, email address, and phone number to keep in touch. There should be a neighborhood watch component - crime prevention is every citizen's responsibility. As human beings, we are responsible for each other. It's your job to make sure your neighbors are okay. Community building begins with your neighbors.

What has surprised you the most about **Highland Park?**

I was shocked at the extravagant number of local government entities and high property taxes. There seem to be some good opportunities to consolidate operations and share services.

What is the message that you would like to tell our readers?

The message is that a sense of community is invaluable. It builds social capital. We tend to be hard on each other, but we need to remember that we are all in this together. Yes, there are offices in City Hall, but, YOU are the government. Democracy is a do-it-yourself enterprise.

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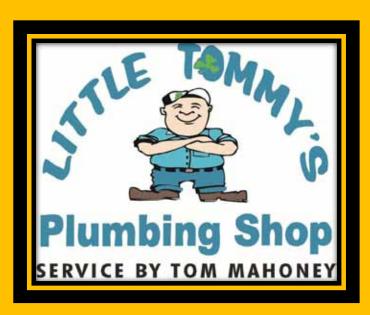

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MACnician's Brian Sugarman offers these tips for Mac Users

BACKUP YOUR DATA

Hard drive failure is the most common component to go bad on any computer, be it Mac or PC. The hard drive stores all your information, from applications and documents to music, movies, and photos. As a general rule, always keep a safe copy of your data on an external hard drive. Apple makes backing up easy with Time Machine, which is software that's now built into every Mac, and which talks and works with the external hard drive.

DON'T IGNORE SOFTWARE UPDATES

Apple pushes updates for your Mac frequently, and you shouldn't ignore them.

There are very few viruses that can hurt your Mac, but if Apple becomes aware of one, they will send out a software update. Software updates also correct bugs with both applications and features that are built into Mac OS X.

WHEN YOU HAVE A PROBLEM, FORCE QUIT OR REBOOT

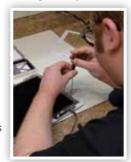
Mac OS X is a rock solid platform, but on occasion, you will have a problem with an application hanging, and you may see the rainbow ball spinning around. The first thing to try is a force quit. Move your mouse to the upper left and click on the Apple icon, and then select Force Quit. A box will pop

up allowing

you to quit the unresponsive application. If you still experience problems or strange behavior, click the Apple icon again and restart your Mac. Restarting weekly is a

good practice, and it will keep your Mac running smoothly.
