Lacy's farewell

Simply turning into driveway awakens a sense of peace in many Clare's Well guests. Arrival at this familiar haven reopens their previous experiences of rest and being in touch with what really matters to them. These days, however, something stimulates a vague disturbance in the familiar environment as guests pull up to the farm house and step out of the car looking first of all for Lacy, always the first to welcome them. Where is Lacy? Something's missing. Yes, there is someone significant missing.

Guests grew to count on our collie Lacy to come running excitedly from wherever she was to say, "Welcome!" as soon as any car came in. Visitors eagerly anticipated her greeting and wagging tail. Lacy fulfilled this duty with obvious joy for the 12 years she lived with us. Then, with the assistance of a vet who came to help her make the step from this world to the next, she died July 22.

The photo below, taken during our anniversary party on June 9, accurately shows how Lacy welcomed visitors this summer—with her tired body lying down in the middle of the yard and people coming to her instead of her running to them. The lessening of her physical ability didn't change what she valued. She was forever committed to being where people were.

Lacy stopped drinking water or eating anything (even treats) the last few days but continued to respond with a look of recognition when we sat by her. In death, as in life, we are deeply moved by Lacy's innate wisdom. We marvel how she maintained her peaceful presence.

Her last will and testament for us seemed to be:

I am ready to die now. Death is a gift as my legs won't carry me anymore. It helps that you also see this has been coming, and I'm so grateful you aren't hauling me off to see a doctor, but are trusting nature's course.

Bury me here at Clare's Well. Here's where I lived the good life of inner quiet. Here's where I've enjoyed Earth's vibrations, lying on her lap and feeling her heart beat as I have year after year. I'm energized by my kinship with Earth. She is waiting to receive my body and remake it back into her very self.

Your kindness will go with me and all the goodness you've shown me will flow into the universe. Thank everyone for all their treats and loving rubs of my ears. The joy we've shared will live on. Don't be surprised when you feel me brushing close to you as you walk to the mailbox or garden. Pay attention. Watch for me. Your heart will skip a beat in unexpected moments. And remember nothing happens by chance. Everything in this universe is connected to everything else. I love you with all of my collie heart. Look for synchronicities and see me continue to welcome you.
