Minnesota responds to Climate Crisis

I recently met a woman who has never heard a loon's call! She is forgiven since she grew up in California and is now working in Washington, D.C. To us here in mid-Minnesota, not to hear the loon is like not having summer. To us the loon means that there is a healthy water supply, that the winter and summer habitats are adequate, that the food supply has not been devastated by herbicides and pesticides. But the earth is warming. An Audubon study published in the September 2014 National Geographic found that, in a study of 588 bird species, "314 could lose most of the area they currently occupy. Some species will find hospitable conditions elsewhere, but for 126 species there will be nowhere else to go." Our precious loon is in this category.

Progressive thinkers here in Minnesota have announced an all-star gathering on climate change to be held in October 2015. Dozens of former world

leaders are expected here to explore ways that "democratic nations can reduce greenhouse emissions." (Star Tribune September 2014).
