Rest, reflection, renewal and ritual

Place is formative. Books have been written about this phenomenon and we all experience it. In this issue of *Sabbath Stirrings* we find a few reflections from persons living at Sabbath House, working at Sabbath House, volunteering at Sabbath House. I'll begin . . .

Growing up, my only connection to "Sabbath" was the third commandment in the Bible, "Remember to keep holy the Sabbath." Being Catholic we quickly translated that into worshipping on Sunday. Worshipping on Saturday was for Jewish people, of whom we had no knowledge. Then over time I learned some things:

- My sister married into a Jewish family. From them I have learned a good bit of Jewish faith and culture.
- In 2001 I spent sabbatical time in Nicaragua where I had lived. Every evening I read a small portion of the book, *Sabbath*, by Wayne Muller. Earlier that year Sister Noreen Bentfield and I had talked about having a hospitality house in Minneapolis and wondered what to call it. "Sabbath House" was the answer.

There are several Jewish women in a Rosen Movement class I attend. Often I'll hear of holy days and traditions. Some of them have presented at "A Practice of Sabbath Day," a workshop given at Sabbath House.

In Jewish tradition, Sabbath is not a solitary, private practice. It is a gathering, a sharing, a being together with a specific purpose: to recall God's presence, to remember what God has done while being God's community. The Sabbath is a time for rest and reflection.

These sources have given me an appreciation, if not a consistent practice of, "remember to keep the Sabbath holy." And living in a place called Sabbath House helps me remember.
