Paperwork turned in for April elections

Fewer people seeking elected seats locally in 2011

Waukesha - Despite the political fever as the new year gets underway, not many people are seeking elected seats locally in 2011. Most candidates had to have their completed paperwork with collected signatures returned to their local city hall, village hall or town hall by 2 p.m. Tuesday in order to set the wheels in motion for the April elections.

In Waukesha, only two of its administrative seats are contested for the spring election. The race with the most candidates is Director of Public Works, but he declined to seek re-election. Phil Koch, Richard Radtke and Andy DeHaven are all vying for the seat, said Waukesha City Clerk/Treasurer Clara Kostik. Radtke is retiring as the city building inspector and Koch is the former publisher and sales manager of Area Editor Magazine, a County Publishing publication, which also owns The Freeman. A primary will be held for the seat.

In Director of Animal Husbandry will be challenging incumbent Steven Johnson. Uncontested races will include Alderman Eric Payne for District 3 and Alderman Chris Hernandez for District 4, Kostik said.

In District 5, Alderman Paul Parnier will not be seeking re-election. Heriberto Wacha is the only person to have taken out papers to seek the seat.
